Occasionally one hears about a child who shows remarkable skill or talent in a particular area, such as music, art, math, or chess. These children often become famous at a young age and are faced with unique pressures. Some go on to enjoy successful adult lives, while ___36__ fade into obscurity or end up facing failure as adults. Because environment is so important, one really cannot predict ___37__ early signs of intelligence or talent alone will necessarily lead to a happy life.

Artist Pablo Picasso showed an interest in drawing very early, before he could even speak. He asked for paintbrushes as a young child, and demanded that he ___38__ to draw at school as much as he liked. His father, also an artist, supported and instructed him, and sent him to art school. By the time Pablo was 13, his father felt that he had surpassed him ___39__ painting skill. During his life, Picasso founded the Cubist movement, and created over 22,000 works of art.

Similarly, Marie Curie showed early intelligence and taught herself to read in Russian and French at age four. She displayed an prodigious memory and helped her older siblings with their math. Marie's parents are both impoverished teachers, ___40___ they insisted on educating their kids on their own. In Marie's lifetime she earned two Nobel prizes, one in physics and the other in chemistry. In both examples, it seems that the supportive family environment helped the gifted children grow into successful adults.

Countries with fragile economies and infrastructure may see tourism as a great opportunity for economic and social development. However, tourism developments may not always be the answer to a country's economic woes and they can sometimes do more harm than good.

Every year, around 140 million people travel from an industrialized country to a developing one. Many will be on a holiday that will have cost thousands of dollars. The money spent by holidaymakers is an important source of income to the people living in the destination countries. However, often less than half the revenue from the trip actually stays in that country—sometimes the 'revenue leakage" can be as much as 80 percent.

In addition, moderate or mass tourism can put a huge strain on the developing country's society and its infrastructure such as roads, water, electricity and sewage treatment. That's not to mention the environmental impact. Take Jamaica for example. This Caribbean island paradise has been a mass tourist destination for many years and its economy is partly dependent on tourism. Yet tourism has <u>put a huge strain</u> on the natural resources of the country and is, in part, responsible for pollution, loss of animal and plant species, coral reef destruction, and erosion of beaches.

The local community suffers from loss of natural public beaches, water shortages, and a significant amount of the food used by the hotels is imported rather being purchased from local farms. A lot of the hotels are gated from the rest of the community because of high crime rates, but in some ways this further isolates the tourists from the local population—other than those employed as staff at the resorts.
