In many professional sports games across the United States, players, coaches and referees are not the only people on camera. Every fan is of interest to security officials, who would use tiny, hard-to-see cameras to capture a shot of each person who passes through the stadium gates. The organizers of any huge athletic event have to anticipate trouble and try to stop it before it starts.

Security officials hope to do so by using machines that recognize faces. Each face seen by the gate-mounted cameras is compared to the data in local and federal law-enforcement computer systems. The data includes photos of people previously arrested for stealing, causing fights, and other illegal activities. If a fan's picture matched one in the database, security officials could closely monitor him or her and perhaps even make an arrest.

Not everyone thinks this kind of surveillance is a good thing. It has stirred some controversy about possible threats to the privacy rights of individuals. People being captured on camera are not told their pictures are being taken. In addition, the technology has not been proven to be reliable. What if the system points out an innocent person as a criminal by mistake?

Security officials say the face-recognition system's great benefits justify any small inconvenience. Banks, shopping malls, and government buildings are already equipped with security cameras, and no one has a problem with that. Why complain about the system used at sports events? One big difference is that it involves "biometric" technology. It analyzes physical traits to establish a person's identity, records the images, and instantly recognizes the people wherever they go.

Instead of humans analyzing a video to see who was depicted, machines do the identifying. Advocates of biometric systems say this makes the system more scientific. Computers can compare exact measurements of facial features in order to avoid mistakes. Opponents of such systems object. They argue that machines are easily fooled by such simple devices as hats, glasses, makeup, or new hairstyles. Humans are a lot better at recognizing individuals, they say, than computer systems are.

Since the 1970s, meditation and other stress-reduction techniques have been studied as possible treatments for depression and anxiety. One such practice, yoga, has received less attention in the medical literature, though it has become increasingly popular in recent decades. One national survey estimated, for example, that about 7.5% of U.S. adults had tried yoga at least once, and that nearly 4% practiced yoga in the previous year.

Yoga classes can vary from gentle and accommodating to strenuous and challenging; the choice of style tends to be based on physical ability and personal preference. Hatha yoga, the most common type of yoga practiced in the United States, combines three elements: physical poses, controlled breathing, and a short period of deep relaxation or meditation. Available reviews of a wide range of yoga practices suggest they can reduce the impact of exaggerated stress responses and may be helpful for both anxiety and depression. In this respect, yoga functions like other self-soothing techniques, such as meditation, relaxation, exercise, or even socializing with friends. By reducing perceived stress and anxiety, yoga appears to moderate stress response systems. This, in turn, decreases physiological arousal—for example, reducing the heart rate, lowering blood pressure, and easing respiration. There is also evidence that yoga practices help increase heart rate variability, an indicator of the body's ability to respond to stress more flexibly.

Although many forms of yoga practice are safe, some are strenuous and may not be appropriate for everyone. In particular, elderly patients or those with mobility problems may want to check first with a clinician before choosing yoga as a treatment option. But for many patients dealing with depression, anxiety, or stress, yoga may be a very appealing way to better manage symptoms. Indeed, the scientific study of yoga demonstrates that mental and physical health are not just closely related, but are essentially equivalent. The evidence is growing that yoga practice is a relatively low-risk, high-yield approach to improving overall health.
